Students who arrive at school between 8.15am and 8:30am are supervised by a staff member in one of the two designated before school seating areas (*Prep-Year 2 in the Prep/Year 1 eating area, Year 3-6 undercover area near tuckshop*). No devices are to be used during this time nor ball games played. Students must remain seated. Once the 8:30am bell has sounded and upon being dismissed, students may put their hats on and play until the 8:38am bell. Students are encouraged to not arrive before 8.15am.

The school day commences at 8:40am. A signal bell sounds at 8:38am to alert students to be ready to enter their classes at 8:40am. It is important that students arrive at school on time as late arrivals disrupt teaching and learning.

The school day ends at 2:45pm. Please remember that punctuality in collecting your child is also important. A round-up bell sounds at 3:05pm advising all students who have not been collected to report to the office.

HATS

Reversible broad brimmed bottle green hat (from uniform shop)

HAIR

- Hair must be neat and tidy and away from the student's face.
- Long hair (past shoulders) is to be tied up (boys and girls).
- Hair accessories are to be green, gold, neutral, black or white.
- No extreme hairstyles are permitted.
- Hair to be natural colours.

ACCESSORIES

- Make up is not to be worn.
- Nails must be natural.
- Earrings are to be sleepers or small studs only. Only ear piercings permitted.
- Watches are acceptable. Smart watches can only be used in school mode.
- No other jewellery is permitted (no rings, necklaces, bracelets), with the exception of medical alert jewellery.
- Cultural/religious jewellery can only be worn under clothing after a written application to the Principal is approved.

SHIRTS

School polo shirt (with emblem) or checked school dress shirt (with emblem) to be worn.

SHORTS/SKIRTS

Bottle green shorts (just above the knee) or skorts.

DRESSES

Checked school dresses with emblem

Communication

Communication between families and teachers is vitally important. We value these relationships so much at Currumbin State School, that instead of hosting one parent teacher meeting at the beginning of the year, we invite each family in to meet the staff individually.

If you are ever concerned, want to check details, or want to share a family situation, our classroom teachers are only a phone call or email away. Families will receive the teacher email at the beginning of each year, so as you can easily keep in touch with teachers. Sometimes a quick email is enough. Otherwise, you can request a phone call or meeting with your classroom teacher at any time throughout the year.

We also have a broad range of support staff from the Principal, Deputy Principals, Head of Inclusion, Inclusion staff and our superb front office staff, who are also always available to assist.

Many classes at Currumbin use Seesaw as an App to link school and home. There is a seamless collaboration between all the adults in a student's life, from administrators and classroom teachers to family members. Seesaw can be used as a school to home messaging system with multimedia attachments, along with student portfolios of their work to keep all adults informed about student learning on a secure online platform.

Dental Service

All Queensland resident children four years of age or older who have not completed Year 10 are eligible for publicly funded oral health care via Queensland Health's Child and Adolescent Oral Health Services (previously referred to as the School Dental Service / Program). A dental van visits the school on an annual basis. For appointments phone 1300 300 850.

Dogs

Dogs are not permitted in the grounds. Students are asked not to bring pets to school unless permission is sought through your class teacher and their relevant Deputy Principal.

Uniform Policy - Infringement Notices

- If a student is not in the correct uniform the parent/carer may be contacted.
- Continued non-compliance with the uniform policy may result in the student being issued with an infringement notice.
- If a student incurs three infringement notices in a semester, they will be required to meet with a member of the school leadership team to discuss the uniform infringement during their break times until this is corrected.

Excursions / Camps

Head Lice

It is important for all parents to regularly check their child's head for head lice and commence effective treatment if found. Homework

Homework provides students with opportunities to deepen and practise their understanding and skills, relative to content that has been presented to them.

Education Queensland Homework policy (2018) states that homework benefits students by complementing classroom learning and providing opportunities for students to be responsible for their own learning.

The amount of homework should be balanced across all learning areas to allow sufficient time for family, recreation, and community and cultural activities. Homework provides an extension to our differentiated curriculum by offering students tailored tasks that either enrich or support their learning.

Illness / Medication

Students with infectious diseases may be excluded from school for specified times. If your child contracts a notifiable disease, please inform the office immediately. In cases of minor ailments, parents use their own judgement as to whether a child is fit to attend school. If your child has a specific health related problem, please discuss this at enrolment and with your child's teacher so that the appropriate measures can be put in place.

Medication may only be administered to a student by staff when the medicine is prescribed by a doctor and in the original container or with a doctor's letter and with the parent's written permission. Parents will need to complete necessary documentation before leaving medicine at school. Please ask for assistance in these circumstances. In circumstances where your child requires preventative medication, (eg. asthma) please discuss these details on enrolment and speak with your child's teacher. It is vital that you keep the school updated about any relevant changes.

Kiss and Go

We offer three kiss and go areas around the school – Philip Street, Mitchell Street and Westview Street. Kiss and go zones operate with the following rules –

- Pick up and drop off only
- Maximum 2 minutes
- Do not leave your vehicle
- Do not park across driveways
- Do not stop in the middle of the road

Please be mindful of the school neighbours prior to parking in the area.

Mobile Phones

From Term 1 2024, all state school students must keep their mobile phones switched off and 'away for the day' during school hours. Wearable devices, such as smartwatches, can be worn; however, notifications MUST be switched off so that phone calls, messages and other notifications cannot be sent or received during school hours.

P&C Association

Our P & C is a group of dedicated parents and carers who work hard to build our school community and make improvements to our school environment. Fundraising contributes to the purchasing of school resources and infrastructure.

P&C Payments

Parents/Carers are able to use Qkr! (pronounced 'quicker') to order students tuckshop and uniforms, pay for Swim Lessons as well as buy tickets for P&C run events like the annual Parents Trivia Night.

The Qkr! app can be downloaded for free from Apple or GooglePlay.

The P&C manage the Tuckshop, Uniform Shop, Currumbin Dolphins Swim Club and Currumbin Kids Club. All of our P&C's profits go back into the school to benefit our students.

The P & C meet once a month on the third Monday of the month during term time or as advertised on the school facebook page.

Report cards are emailed to parents in the final week of each semester (June and December).

Safety Procedures

All Visitors / Volunteers must report to the school office upon arrival to sign in and collect a visitor's pass. Emergency evacuations and lock in drills are performed each term. Emergency evacuation posters are displayed in all rooms.

School Council

The school council consists of the P&C President, school Principal and elected parent and staff members. The School Council meets once per term. The School Council, Parents and Citizens Association (P&C) and the Local Consultative Council (LCC) have a collective responsibility to our core business which is improving the social, emotional wellbeing and academic performance of our students. The Council is constituted to improve student learning outcomes by helping to guide the strategic direction of the school and is an important part of our school governance structures.

Sport Houses

The school has four sport houses – *Talobilla (yellow), Pirruen (red), Buran (blue) and Wirra (green)*. Your child's house colour will be allocated at enrolment. Siblings are placed in the same house.

The four sport houses are represented on the Currumbin State School Shield and were adopted in the 1960's using Aboriginal names appropriate to certain features of the district at the time.

Tuckshop

Our Tuckshop is open for pre-ordering from 8:30 am each morning. Parents/Carers can order online using the Qkr! app. All online orders should be placed by 8:15 am. Copies of the menu can be obtained from the canteen.

Ordering Online (preferred method)

- Register online at Qkr!
- The tuckshop will receive the online order and a label with the student's name, class and order
- details will be attached to a tuckshop bag and placed in your child's class bag.
- Please ensure the student's class is accurate, and you have selected the correct delivery date.

Ordering at School

- Ordering must be done using separate lunch bags for hot and cold food. Please clearly label these bags with the individual child's name and class.
- Separate orders are required if ordering for both breaks.
- Please ensure all lunch orders are given directly to the tuckshop.
- For the first break, a tuckshop monitor from each class will collect the bags and take them to the eating area to be distributed.
- Second break orders are to be collected directly from the tuckshop.

Volunteering

What Your Child Should Bring To School Each Day

- One named (inside please) school bag to carry belongings
- Spare clothes in a <u>named</u> (inside please) large plastic bag which should be left in their school bag, in case of an accident.
- Lunch suitably wrapped and a drink, preferable in a lunch box that is "bird-proof". Please only send items students can unwrap themselves or use a 'nude' lunchbox with compartments.

 Please note: No lollies, soft drinks, glass bottles or ring-pull cans.
- Healthy snack fruit or vegetables.
- Nut products are not recommended.
- Homework (as required)



Attendance

Absences

Regular school attendance will mean that your child has a better chance in life. Your child will achieve better when they go to school all day, every school day. Under Queensland law, you must make sure your child is enrolled and attends school all day, every school day unless they have an acceptable reason.

ACCEPTABLE REASONS

- Illness
- Important medical /specialist appointments
- Representative Sport
- Bereavement



UNACCEPTABLE REASONS

- Holidays (please avoid)
- Visiting family
- Birthdays
- Sleeping in

Parents will receive an SMS message chasing the absence reason if their child is absent. You must inform the school with the reason within 2 school days of their return.

Students absent for 11 days or longer (Exemptions)

Parents can apply for an exemption when their child cannot attend school for a period of eleven consecutive school days or longer. You are encouraged to discuss with the school whether an application for exemption is a suitable option. Decisions about exemptions are made by the Principal.

Late Arrival

Any student who arrives at school after the roll has been marked or after 9:00am needs to go to the office for a late slip.



Early Collection

We discourage children from being collected before 2:45pm. If you must collect your child early from school you will need to present to the office and they will call your child down for collection.

Allergies and Anaphylaxis Policy

Anaphylaxis is a severe and sudden allergic reaction. It occurs when a person is exposed to an allergen to which they are sensitive.


Allergens or trigger substances that may cause anaphylaxis in school-aged children are:

- ✓ peanuts
- ✓ tree nuts
- √ fish
- √ shellfish
- √ eggs
- ✓ cow's milk
- √ insect stings
- √ certain medications
- ✓ Other potential allergens may include soy, sesame, wheat, seeds, coconut and latex.



"Although it may be possible to minimise students' exposure to potential allergens within the school environment, the implementation of blanket food bans or attempts to prohibit the entry of particular food substances into schools is not supported by Education Queensland, Queensland Health and the Australasian Society of Clinical Immunology and Allergy (ASCIA). Schools should not make claims that their school is 'peanut/nut free' as this is impossible to guarantee and may lead to a false sense of security about exposure to allergens."

As students may be allergic to several foods it is not possible, nor practical, to remove all food allergens from schools. Nor is it possible to remove all insects that students are allergic to.



- ✓ We maintain a minimum of one school adrenaline auto-injector stored within the first aid room.
- ✓ We encourage children to wash hands before and after eating.
- ✓ We teach students that sharing food and utensils is not permitted.
- ✓ The tuckshop coordinator is aware of issues related to anaphylaxis and measures to reduce the incidence of an emergency event.
- ✓ Students with anaphylaxis have Anaphylaxis Action Plans.
- ✓ Staff members are trained in anaphylaxis management and in administering an adrenaline autoinjector.



Programs on Offer

Music Program

Throughout their early schooling years, all students learn to listen, perform and develop a knowledge of musical elements. They learn to discriminate forms and styles of music and to attend to particular qualities in the music of different composers, countries, cultures and periods.

Instrumental Music Program

Currumbin State School offers a comprehensive music program fostering creativity, discipline, teamwork and higher order thinking. Educating the whole child with the inclusion of music and the arts enhances the quality of education within the school.

Aims of the Instrumental Music Program

To Provide:

- Opportunities for musical development of students through instruction on a group basis.
- Ensemble experience so that students develop ensemble performance skills as an integrated part of their music education. This will be provided by students becoming members of a school band or string ensemble.
- Opportunities for students to perform in the community.
- An extra dimension to the overall school music program.
- Added social and mental stimulation for students.

Entry into the strings program occurs from Year 3

Lessons are provided in school time by our music teachers. On gaining an appropriate standard, students join an ensemble offering participation opportunities in school assemblies, school functions, eisteddfods and community events. For further information about instruments, tuition, student selection, attendance, communication, costs involved and parental commitment please refer to the Instrumental Music Handbook.

Choir

The choirs offer a varied and challenging repertoire for those students who value the joy of singing. They represent the school in ceremonies, competitions and community events. Students in Year 1-3 are eligible for the Junior Choir then move into the Senior Choir in Years 4-6. We also offer a boys choir in Years 2-6.

Drumbeat

Selected students participate in a 10 week lunchtime program with a focus on developing social skills. The program culminates in a drum circle performance utilizing the Djembe, an African percussion instrument.

Dance Program

Currumbin State School offers several before school dance programs, taught by staff from Signature Dance (local dance school). Programs offered are tailored to student ability/interest levels from competitive teams who perform at various Eisteddfods to fun groups who learn dance skills and perform at school events. In 2023, we also launched a Boys Hip-Hop Crew.

Sports Program

The Currumbin State School core Physical Education Curriculum will be taught by the school specialist staff. The school may also offer extra coaching sessions and gala days during the year with visiting professionals.

Representative School Sport

Currumbin State School participates in weekly interschool sport in both the summer and winter seasons. We also compete in the three major carnivals (swimming, cross country and athletics) during the year. There are also opportunities for students aged from 10 to 12 years to compete in district trials for a variety of sports. This process usually involves school trials and nomination through to a district trial.

Process for Students Attending District and Regional Sport Events

- Parents complete the SSSC Permission & Details Booklet using online version
- Parents print out the completed online SSSC Permission & Details Booklet
- Parents take online completed SSSC Permission & Details Booklet to the students' school to get the Principal (or nominee's) signature
- Students/Parents then bring this fully completed booklet to the regional trials and hand it in to the district managers prior to competition
- NB. If the steps above are not followed the students will not be allowed to compete.

LOTE

All students in Years 5 and 6 learn Spanish as an additional language. It is important that students gain a respect and understanding of another culture and are exposed to different beliefs, customs and lifestyles. Spanish is made fun through interactive activities, games, songs and cultural celebration days, such as our fun packed Latin Fiesta at the end of term three.

Social Emotional Learning - Second Step

- The whole school is using a program called Second Step
- We want your child to be as successful as possible at school. Success in school is not just about reading and maths. It is also about knowing how to learn and how to get along with others.
- Second Step has a Kids Matter rating of 5/5 as it covers the essential competencies of self-awareness, social awareness, self – management, responsible decision making and relationship skills.

Digital Citizenship

The ethical use of ICT is embedded across all Curriculum areas. Students are made aware of social and ethical practices and the importance of information security when using ICT to create, communicate and manage devices.

Engaging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Students

Currumbin State School embraces Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders cultures and embeds Indigenous perspectives into the curriculum. We are strongly committed to closing the gap.

This is evidenced by:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives embedded in curriculum.
- Celebration of significant Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander events such as NAIDOC Week.
- Reference Group Meeting with community members and Elders once per term.
- Extensive networks with support agencies.

Religious Instruction Classes

Our school offers Religious Instruction classes for half an hour each week during school hours for Year 1-6 students. We currently offer Christian religious instruction. Refer to School website for more information.

Inclusion Team

Inclusive Practice Teachers

STL&Ns work within school teams and with students to improve student achievement. They assist with planning, preparation and delivery of effective learning and teaching programs for identified students to improve their learning outcomes. They also provide support and advice on the teaching of students with diverse learning needs and work alongside classroom teachers to contribute additional expertise in planning, teaching, assessing and monitoring student achievement and progress.

Speech Language Pathologist (SLP)

Speech-language therapy services are provided for students with difficulties in communication enrolled or registered in state education facilities. The focus of these services is to enhance students' educational programs and outcomes. These students require assistance to develop competencies in the areas of communication, language, learning and literacy.

English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EAL/D)

In consultation with the school leadership team, EAL/D teachers work within school teams and with students, parents/caregivers and communities to identify and improve the learning outcomes of all EAL/D students. They provide individual and whole school support and assist with planning, preparation and delivery of effective learning and teaching programs for all EAL/D students focusing on English language acquisition across the curriculum.

Wellbeing Team

Guidance Officer

Guidance and counselling services are provided in all Queensland state schools and education programs and their focus is on assisting students to achieve to their potential. Guidance Officers may work directly with the student or with the student's teachers and other school staff, family, and specialists or professionals from other agencies outside the school. Guidance Officers, while respecting student privacy and confidentiality, work as members of a support team and are committed to providing quality education services for every young Queenslander regardless of their circumstances.

Social Worker

The Social Worker's role includes the use of professional knowledge and experience to help intervene early in students' mild to moderate mental health concerns. They connect students and their families with support services in the community to support their wellbeing and mental health.

School Chaplain

The school Chaplains purpose is to help our students socially and emotionally. They work within a combined pastoral care, mentoring, and community development context to help provide identified families, students and groups with the best education our school can offer.

Triple P Positive Parenting Program

At certain times throughout the year the school offers this valuable program for you to attend free of charge. Don't miss this valuable opportunity when it arises.

Education Queensland advisory visiting teachers, OTs and physiotherapy support is provided for students with difficulties enrolled or registered in state education facilities. The focus of these services is to support both students and teachers; facilitating access to the Australian Curriculum for all students.
